KEEPING YOUR SPIRITUAL LIFE

***HOT* IN THE MIDDLE**

OF THE WEEK

Daily distractions can keep us from even the best intentions of family devotions, morning Bible-reading, or evening prayer. It's a relief when Sunday morning comes and for a blissful hour and a half we can repose with the congregation in the presence of God. Hymns, the homily and Eucharist, and even coffee hour fellowship replenish the soul. All is peaceful, and the spirit refreshed. Until Sunday night . . .

Then the rat race starts again. Meals have to be made, homework done, the business meeting prepared for, the car needs an oil change, and somehow all the bounce gets sucked out of our spiritual step. There are a few ways that I have found refresh my soul even in the midst of a busy day. You might want to try one of them whenever you need a pick me up. For instance:

- It only takes a few seconds to say a prayer—out loud or silently. Frequent conversation with God (think about responding to a text message) keeps communication lines clear
- I'm rarely disciplined to sit down with the Bible and read it through, but I do keep an open Bible in my office. That way I can read a chapter while I am settling into my day (putting my coffee down, taking my jacket off, and turning on the computer). This keeps me in touch with the Word.
- Driving time can be used to listen to a sermon on the radio or downloaded to a BlackBerry. It's hard to have road rage when you're listening about love.
- Finally, saying a quick blessing over a shared meal (or snack) helps us to realize how blessed we are to have food everyday, and food abundantly!

These are only things that I have found helpful. See what works for you. God always listens, no matter what, and is like an all-loving parent who accepts us as is. Rejoice in that.

YOU ARE ST. ANDREW'S

With the Annual Meeting rapidly approaching, this Sunday the 29th, I thought that my monthly entry for January (representing the Stewardship Committee) should center around Mutual Care and Fellowship. Comprising only about 0.99 % of the 2011 budget breakdown, this area of service comprises a number of ministries that are so important to the church.

Clyde has outlined, in his January 11th edition of *The Chimes*, that there is an acute need and importance in pledging so that so many of our programs might be sustained. In that light, **Mutual Care and Fellowship**, integral to much of what happens at St. Andrew's, needs our support. I would like to briefly focus on the ministries of: *Community Building and Fellowship*, *The Newcomers' Ministry*, the *Nonfiction Book Club*, and *Sunday Hospitality*

Sheila Benger has been most integral and involved with **Community Building and Fellowship**, which is really responsible for the overall coordination of social events at our parish. Certainly our *Welcome Back Sunday BBQ* in September, the *Blessing of the Animals* in October, the making of pies and goodies for Thanksgiving, and December's *Advent Fiesta*, *Advent Wreath making*, *Cookie Swap*, and *social events* all make for memorable times. Add to this *Games Night* and *the upcoming Mardi Gras celebration* on Shrove Tuesday, plus Holy Week and Easter events, and you have a parish worthy of your support.

The **Newcomers' Ministry** is another area that supports our church while attempting to grow our parishioner base. While relying pretty much on volunteers, this ministry is coordinated by Pat Dunbar and our office staff. The ministry attempts to reach out to any and all newcomers (identified as such by members who make their acquaintance in service and coffee hour and then alert the office) so that they might be identified and properly welcomed and introduced to other parishioners and to be made aware of our church calendar of events.

The remaining two ministries: the **Nonfiction Book Group**, coordinated presently by Bonnie Howard, and **Sunday Hospitality**, comprised of seventeen parishioners who commit to that effort, really do not require church funds to support, but are truly representative of the wonderful opportunities to be shared at St. Andrew's.

Meeting monthly at a given parishioner's home to discuss a nonfiction book, the *Nonfiction Book Group* is a unique way to socialize and make new friends—especially since all are encouraged to attend the meetings even if they have not read the book in question!

Our coffee hour on Sundays would certainly not be the same without the generous support in time and refreshments of our *Sunday Hospitality* group. Presently, these seventeen individuals keep us fed with beverage and goodies after each Sunday service. Pat Dunbar is the contact person to put your name on the list if you choose.



So, **Mutual Care and Fellowship**, as the title implies, is an integral ministry of St. Andrew's, which is truly one of our mission foundations and needs a commitment by one and all to submit a pledge for the new year.

THE CLOISTER GALLERY

**“Respite: Patterns and Places
Real and Imagined”
Artwork of Christine O’Brien
through February 8**



North Shore artist Christine O'Brien's exhibit of mixed media works is currently on display. “Respite: Patterns and Places Real and Imagined” combines pixels with traditional fine art materials. The hybrid artworks incorporate digital imagery and photography with acrylics, collage, and other media to create layers of texture and abstract meaning. In each piece there is a unique surface, and a synergy between materials not evident until all of the pieces of the puzzle are in place.

“Respite: Patterns and Places Real & Imagined” has, at its core, digital photography, shot by O'Brien in places as varied as the White Mountains of NH and the streets of New York City. Inspired by nature, even in the city, she seeks the essence of a place, and layers many images together until a new composition is derived. Rather than a literal replication, O'Brien tries to create a memory of the patterns, colors, and senses she felt at the time of the visit. Ms. O'Brien is a member of the South End gallery Galatea, the Salem Arts Association, and Lynn Arts. Her studio is in the Porter Mill artist building in Beverly, MA.

OUTREACH OPPORTUNITY FOOD PANTRY LIAISON

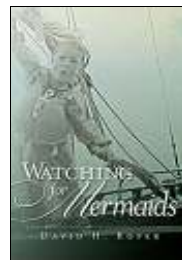
