DEAR FRIENDS,

I'm writing today with an eye on the annual meeting. We gather once a year to receive reports from all of our ministry areas, to elect a new vestry class, to hear how our budget fared over the last year and to present a new budget. In addition to all of that super fun stuff, we get to hear about how our capital campaign, Growing into our Future, is doing regarding not only how the funds are coming in but also how they are being allocated and how much has been spent on our list of projects. We will have some comments from the wardens and me about our ministry together and there are opportunities for other staff to speak as well as opportunities to comment or ask questions. Finally, I pick a couple of ministry areas and take a few moments to highlight that ministry and thank the people involved in that area of our work for the Gospel. I'm hoping that you will join us for this important business that our parish conducts on the last Sunday in January. The vestry will be joining the hospitality team that day in offering an expanded coffee hour so you can have a bite to eat over the course of the meeting.

On the heels of that, the new vestry will be going on retreat on Jan. 31 to Feb 1. This is a most important meeting for the life of our vestry. It really sets the tone of our work for the entire year. While not a lot of business is conducted, the important thing is that over that 18-or-sohour period, we become a group. We deal with themes that drive the life of our church and consider our roles as leaders raised up within community. The majority of our time is spent in conversation around how the church plays a role in our lives, both individually and corporately. We go over a yearly calendar parsing out various activities and are assigned a particular role within the vestry. The spiritual refreshment comes from the retreat theme presented by a retreat leader on Friday, but continues as our conversations deepen. During this time, we actually HAVE time to spend considering many perspectives. I ask your prayers for our vestry during that crucial period of our formation as a team.

You will find in this *Chimes* biographies of the slate of members who are being considered for the vestry. Please take a few moments to familiarize yourself with the people on the slate of candidates.

Vestry

Ginny Coffin: In my journey to St. Andrew's I was raised and educated as a Roman Catholic. Twenty-five years ago, I struggled with the roles, or lack of roles, of women in the Catholic faith. Around this time, my good friend's daughter passed away and I went to her funeral. It was the first time I had ever been in a Protestant church. My husband and I attended the service at St. Peter's Church in Beverly. During this very sad occasion, I was heartened by the kindness, welcoming, and finally sacredness of the whole church community as they honored Meg's passing.

I thought this could be the place for me and my family. The door opened. We walked in, and we never left.

Through the years, I have had the honor of serving in different roles—greeting many of you in the role of usher, sharing the Eucharist as a communion minister, and participating in search committees.

It has been a pleasure to connect with our precious children and all of you in any role. Our community has always demonstrated a calling for service, and I would be honored to carry that on as a member of the vestry.

Paul Crowley: I've been a member of St. Andrew's for some years now. Neither my wife, Resha, nor I can remember the exact year, other than that it was a little after Kevin Bean's departure. Resha originally started attending services and—as often happens in my life with her—I was drawn in her wake.

Why am I interested in becoming a vestry member? Perhaps I can best answer by quoting a paragraph from my annual Christmas letter, 2019 edition: "Our Sundays are framed by two activities which bookend the day and anchor the week. The day begins with morning service at the local Episcopal church, whose small scale and warmly welcoming congregation make a fitting setting for contemplation and worship. It ends with our meditation group/sangha, now a couple of decades old." Having benefited so much over the years from this supportive, active, and creative community, I felt that by now it was time for me to contribute further energy towards St. Andrew's life as the new decade dawns.

What do I bring to the task? I shrink from describing my qualifications (or am I employing what Proust calls "the crafty voice of modesty"?). I've never considered myself to be a visionary or a leader. But in whatever organizations I've been a member, I have tended to play a supportive role, reliably present, reasonably calm during discussions, attentive to group dynamics, and sometimes functioning as a mediator. I hope that these qualities and whatever else I can contribute to the vestry will aid St. Andrew's in its onward march.

Paul Dulac: My wife, Becky, and I have been attending St. Andrew's for about five years. We have enjoyed Clyde's leadership and the feeling of fellowship from attending Sunday services as well as the sense of community and common effort involved with the biannual Rummage Sale and other church events. We split our time between a home in New Hampshire and an apartment in Marblehead and find ourselves spending more time in Marblehead in the fall, winter, and spring. The opposite of many snowbirds. Our home in New Hampshire is on a lake, which draws us and family members there in the summer.

I'll try to capsulate my career briefly. I have been involved in education my entire life. After playing football for and graduating from the Univ. of Maine in 1970, I went on to coach football at Colby College for six years. Following that, a couple of years as a high school administrator in central Maine led me to a doctoral program at Vanderbilt Univ. Upon completion of that degree, our family (we had all three sons at that point) spent a year in Buckingham County, England on a Fulbright Educational Exchange. My career in educational administration continued when we came back to the States with a few years as an asst. superintendent in Ames, Iowa. In the spring of 1987, I became superintendent of schools in Plymouth, NH, followed by five years as superintendent in Newburyport.

In 1998 I was selected to be headmaster of the International School of Beijing, a private international school for expat children. Living and working in China was a life-changing experience for Becky and me. We returned to the States in 2003 where I finished my career as school superintendent, first in Martha's Vineyard and then Marblehead. I retired from Marblehead Public Schools in 2011.

At that point our youngest son was a house builder in NH. He built our retirement home on a small lake that Becky's family had been visiting for generations. We became part of the small community in Washington, NH—Becky serving on the library board of trustees and me on the town Planning Board. After several winters in Washington we realized we needed to go south in the winter—with 11 grandkids at this point, Marblehead was south enough! Two of our sons and their families live in Marblehead and one in Exeter, NH; therefore, we decided to make Marblehead our winter home.

Within my career in special education, I was able to fulfill my desire to help others. I helped channel the challenges my students faced into opportunities for development of character, self-worth, and persistence.

I was happily married to the love of my life for twentynine years. Together we raised four boys and enjoyed the lives of our five stepchildren. If you were involved with baseball, football, or basketball in town, you may be familiar with the Glabicky name that became synonymous with kids and sports. Our four boys are grown and thriving and I'm awaiting that first wedding announcement!

Even though I am new to the parish, I hope to bring my passion, quest for spirituality, and deep belief in community to the vestry. I bring strong organizational skills, creative problem solving abilities, and an exuberant energy. Saturday Night in Marblehead, our monthly coffeehouse, presents singer-songwriter Tom Smith on Saturday, January 18, at 8 p.m.

Smith's songs, deeply rooted in the old-school folk tradition, tell timeless stories with an honest, sincere voice and have memorable melodies. A native of Pennsylvania who lived in Cambridge in the 1960s, Smith early grew to love self-made music. He performs at festivals, coffeehouses, schools, and concerts throughout the northeastern United States to all sizes of audiences and all ages.

"Contrary to what a lot of people think, folk music is still a living tradition," writes Dave Palmeter of WUMB-FM Boston, host of *Studio Session Live*. "It's a living tradition that feeds on new songs that speak of people's wants, people's needs, people's struggles and people's triumphs. Tom Smith is . . . out of the tradition of say Pete Seeger and

Tom Paxton. . . . He's a man who writes songs that seem like they've always been there. There are very few songwriters working today that I would call folksingers, but I would call Tom Smith a true folksinger."

Doors will open at 7:30 p.m. A suggested donation of \$15 is payable at the door. Light refreshments will be available for purchase.
