DEAR FRIENDS,

We have enjoyed a rather long Epiphany and now, just around the corner, we are looking ahead to Lent. Our Mardi Gras party and Ash Wednesday services will have just occurred by the time you read this. I hope they were well attended and a great kickoff for Lent.

Our Lenten program will be a significant change from our prior years (see p. 4). We are again partnering with St. Michael's, Clifton Lutheran, and St. Stephen's United Methodist for our program. This year we are going to try an online video AND in-person series on the Way of Love. We will record our conversation and post the video to a Facebook page. You can go and watch it anytime. We will meet on Wednesday nights at 7 p.m., beginning March 4 at St. Andrew's (coffee and tea will be provided, but not dinner), and meet weekly until April 1. Each Sunday our churches will meet and offer a 15-20 minute debrief of the video topic, field questions, and record comments and questions for the next video. We will meet in the Guild Room about 10 minutes after coffee hour begins. On the last week of Lent before Holy Week, all of our participants will gather together for a final session on Wednesday, April 1. The location and time TBD. This is something that you can easily forward to folks you know who may not be a part of a faith community. Whether or not they watch it, you can open a door to someone and who knows what might come of that?!

As of this writing, our pledge numbers are at 94 pledging households. We are normally at just over 120. Please, if you have not made a pledge, do so. It is not too late and your support will help us allocate our funds responsibly. Even if you are giving consistently, a pledge helps us to forecast our funds and spend wisely. Otherwise, we will have to adjust our spending this year as we are looking at a deficit of nearly \$50k. Your vestry approved our budget at the beginning of the year with the same expected pledges as we had last year. We did this because the pledge drive was initiated only in mid-December. We felt pretty confident that households who made pledges last year would do the same this year. Now, I at least am beginning to get a little nervous. In order to address this deficit and encourage pledging that may simply have slipped your mind, some of our vestry will be making calls to households who pledged last year and have not yet made a pledge this year. If you haven't already heard, the Good Friday Cantata will observe 40 years since its inception and barring only a couple of years, St. Andrew's has been the yearly home for this powerful rendition of a modern passion play. ST. ANDREW'S HOSTS ST. STEPHEN'S IN WOMEN'S LUNCH

St. Andrew's is looking forward to hosting the women of St. Stephen's-Lynn in a potluck luncheon on **Sunday, March 8, at noon**. Please bring a dish to share. This gathering will center around the current exhibit in our Cloister Gallery, "Black Lives Matter: A Struggle for Justice and Equality," an exhibit of twenty art quilts related to civil rights history and justice reform, created by fabric artist Nancy Earsy.

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CLOISTER GALLERY

"Black Lives Matter: A Struggle for Justice and Equality" Fabric Art by Nancy Franklin Earsy

The Cloister Gallery is featuring a new show entitled "Black Lives Matter: A Struggle for Justice and Equality," an exhibition of small art quilts related to civil rights history and justice reform. The exhibit will run through March 23.

Viewers will see images of civil rights leaders and heroes like Harriet Tubman, Shirley Chisholm, Frederick Douglass, Martin Luther King, and President Obama, interwoven with brightly colored fabrics and embellishments. Pete Seeger and his banjo appear on one quilt, which also includes Norman Rockwell's iconic image of a small girl walking to school accompanied by two federal marshals. Titled "Together We Learn to Read and Write," the quilt echoes Seeger's song imaging children learning together in peace and friendship. It commemorates the Supreme Court ruling that racially segregated education is inherently unequal and violates the Constitution.

Fabric artist Nancy Franklin Earsy, a retired lawyer, began making art quilts in 2006 to share her perspectives on the continuing struggle to realize our American ideals of justice and equality. Her first one celebrated Peace Day, with purple felt praying hands and tiny Tibetan prayer flags. Since then, she's created over 100 art quilts, many of them focused on civil rights. She finds that the practice of designing and sewing small quilts fosters mindfulness and restores her spirits.

THE WAY OF LENT, 2020

This year for Lent, we're trying something new! St. Andrew's, St. Michael's Episcopal, St. Stephen's Methodist, and Clifton Lutheran are coming together for a Lenten series looking closely at Rules of Life, specifically the Way of Love. But this year, we're going hybrid! This year we will be offering a program that is part digital and part in person! We will meet on Wednesday nights at 7 p.m., beginning at St. Andrew's on March 4 (coffee and tea will be provided, but not dinner), and meet weekly until April 1.

We will also be offering a virtual program! Each week the five clergy will gather to record a conversation on Rules of Life and the Way of Love. We will record this and offer it on Facebook as well as our own websites. We will also post weekly reflections on the topic of the week, and various other things throughout the week.

This will be a Lenten discipline, meaning that we are asking those who are interested to truly commit to the discipline, and agree to engage at least twice a week with the digital material. You don't have to attend the meetings to participate in the digital program, though we encourage everyone to participate in both.

Journey with us as we work together to live as Christians in this world, to live into the Way of Love.




BUILDING ON THE PAST AND LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

I read a good book recently, *Six Frigates*, by Ian Toll, about the formation of the U.S. Navy in the late 1700s and its successes and setbacks through the early 1800s (for World War II history enthusiasts, I cannot recommend his *Pacific Crucible* enough. It is excellent, but I digress). In *Six Frigates*, Marblehead gets brief mention for the USS Constitution (one of the original Six Frigates) seeking refuge in the harbor under cannon fire from Fort Sewall, but one of the most interesting parts of the

book was the description of how these sailing vessels were constructed in the first place, using southern pine and live oak, a particularly dense wood prized in shipbuilding for its strength and resistance to moisture. The original frigates were to be built to last—great emphasis was placed on structural integrity and longevity. While times have changed and shipbuilding materials and techniques have made it obsolete, remarkably, the USS Constitution is still floating today.

St. Andrew's was built, literally and figuratively, with the same focus on structural integrity and longevity. One of my favorite aspects of the Sunday experience at St. Andrew's is the worship space itself. The same type of framing system used to build ships over 200 years ago was used to support the roof of the chapel almost 100 years ago.



Unlike the USS Constitution, which has been relegated to floating museum status, St. Andrew's remains vibrant and relevant. The challenge before all of us is how to keep it this way when the wider trends say we should be shrinking. Our attendance and pledging numbers remain flat, and the fact that they are not shrinking is a testament to Clyde's leadership, our emphasis on being a welcoming place, and the generosity of time and treasure from many key members of our church. Our Century Campaign is providing us with a platform to do great things, physical enhancements and an expansion of program with Cara's guidance. Like those sailing vessels from 200 years ago, we have come in for repair in order to reach farther and serve in changing times in fulfillment of our mission.

At our most recent vestry retreat, we began to share our ideas of what a vibrant parish looks like to us now, in 2024, and beyond, and how to grow and sustain our numbers as we approach our second century. Some ideas are really simple like inviting a friend to our Mardi Gras feast or a Sunday service. Other ideas will require a more intentional and sustained outreach campaign. This year we will be reviving some old ideas and trying out some new ones. Everyone at St. Andrew's has a gift to give and a perspective that he or she brings. All ideas are good ideas and will help to bring us all closer together as we look to realize the vision of the Century Campaign with an eye toward longevity.

GOOD FRIDAY CANTATA STUDIO RECORDING: PLEASE LEND YOUR SUPPORT

Dear Friends,

Every now and then, if we miss the news that "it can't be done," we create something new and our worlds are changed. Forty years ago, in response to the Rev. Ward Gamble's kind invitation to me to be something called "artist in residence" at St. Andrew's, I wrote a cantata for Good Friday, titled *Meditations on the Passion*. The blessings it has given me have certainly changed my world. It was a way for me to introduce my faith community to a community of musicians, and to introduce those musicians to this community and to the gospel we seek to proclaim. As I tell the participants every year, they are helping me to pray, as have many of you who have supported the cantata in any way.

With a handful of exceptions, *Meditations on the Passion* has been performed each year at St. Andrew's, its home; it has also been performed in Cambridge, Denver, and New York. Although several of the individual songs have been recorded by different artists, the cantata itself has never been recorded as a complete work. To celebrate the fortieth anniversary of the cantata, we're making plans for a professional studio recording. Dave Mattacks, who has provided spectacular percussion to cantata performances in recent years, has agreed to produce the recording, and we're hoping that we can undertake the recording in late spring or early summer.

I'm writing to request your financial assistance with the recording. Our goal is to raise \$15,000—which will cover all costs of the recording—by May 1. Any assistance you can provide will be most welcome. Please make your check payable to Robert J. At St. Peter's in Cambridge where we performed the cantata one year, I introduced it by asking the question "How far will God go for our sakes?" A voice came loud and unsolicited from a lady who obviously knew the answer well: "All the way, baby!" If we can offer that realization to our community and the world, we will have done good work, and my hope will have been fulfilled. I thank you in advance for doing what you can to help us make *Meditations on the Passion* available to a wider community. And I hope to see you at this year's performance of the cantata, Good Friday, April 10, at 8 p.m.
