DEAR FRIENDS,

I begin my article this month with an apology. Our service on November 10 did not have any mention of Veterans Day. I am deeply sorry to our veterans and I want you to know that it was a simple matter of forgetfulness. I know that is not an excuse and I'm not offering it as one—just the fact. I forgot to make arrangements for special mention in the prayers and at the altar.

Poignantly, one of my own family members who died this year was a veteran of WWII and the Korean War. He served as a medic and was a survivor of the Chosin Reservoir Campaign, a brutal battle near the Chinese border and a deciding factor in the Korean War. I named him at our All Saints' service but I'm feeling doubly bad for missing the prayers and dedication for Veterans Day. Thank goodness Mary Jodice was thoughtful enough to include the Navy Hymn for at least some mention of the day. I am very sorry for my oversight.

We had a loss on our campus. The old apple tree that was on the island in the parking lot was found to be riddled with disease and has been slowly dying. A tree service was doing some work after the recent storm and noted the condition of the tree and offered to remove it. Every other year, that tree would produce wonderful apples. I enjoyed more than one apple crisp from the fruit of that tree. I had heard that it was planted in honor of a teacher in our church school. Judging from the size of the tree, it must have grown in that spot for at least 25 year or so. I for one will miss that old tree. Perhaps as our landscape plan unfolds, we can plant another apple tree on grounds.

Our restarted Adult Forums held between services has been very popular. I want to thank everyone who makes this time a priority to attend. It means a lot when folks prepare for such things and people show up to hear what is being presented, so thanks for that. Our topics continue on the theme of the Way of Love through Advent.

Speaking of Advent, we will be joining with Clifton Lutheran, St. Stephen's Methodist, and St. Michael's for an evening series on Advent. The topic focuses on the apocalyptic lessons of Advent. So our title of the series is called "Apocalypse Now and Not Yet." We will meet for four sessions, three in Advent and one in Epiphany. All sessions will be from 6:30 p.m. till 8:00 p.m. and we will Pentecost

serve dessert and coffee. The conversations will begin at 7:00 p.m. December 4 we will be at Clifton Lutheran, Dec. 11 at St. Michael's, Dec. 18 at St. Stephen's Methodist, and our hosting session will be on January 15. See the flyer on page 6 for more information. If you've ever wondered about people who talk about the end times, this may be a good opportunity to get a lay of the land from three denominational viewpoints.

Happy New Year, everyone! November 24 is Christ the King Sunday and is the last Sunday in the church year. December 1 is Advent One and the start of a new liturgical and musical year in the church.

The youth choir will be singing with us on Christ the King Sunday and they will have a solo piece at communion, Ave Maria, by Anton Dvorak; as well they will sing an Anglican chant with the adult choir on Psalm 46 by Martin Luther. The youth choir has picked up singing Anglican chant in the traditional way, that most choirs in England sing on a regular basis. The adult choir is close behind, but also very good at Anglican chant. I can truly say there is NOT ONE other youth choir on the North Shore that is singing at such a high level. We should be very proud of them and I look forward to seeing their future development as a group.

December 1 sends the adult choir on a road trip to St. Michael's Episcopal Church in Milton. We will join the choir directed by Brink Bush and sing a double choir Advent Lessons and Carols at 5:00 p.m. We welcome our church members to come with us and experience another beautiful traditional church and choir. St. Michael's is special for me as it was built on land owned by Governor Hutchinson (a Tory governor of Massachusetts). He is a distant relative of mine! Look for a return trip from the Milton choir to St. Andrew's in March for Evensong!

December 22 is our own Lessons and Carols at the 10:00 a.m. service. We have designed a hybrid service that includes Advent and Christmas music. December 22 at 5:00 p.m. our choirs will journey to Salem to St. Peter's Episcopal Church to sing sacred and secular Christmas carols for the neighbors and congregation of St. Peter's. The Way of Love—Pray

I have a confession: it took me years to get even a loose grasp on what prayer is. On why we pray. How to pray. Where to pray. What the point of it was if God already knows everything.

At some point I had a realization: prayer isn't just about me.

Prayer is how I grow in relationship with God.

According to the Book of Common Prayer, "Prayer is responding to God, by thought and by deeds, with or without words." (Catechism, pg. 856)

Prayer is an ongoing conversation with a very close friend, one who knows all the details of your life, and loves you anyway.

We can pray silently or aloud, with words or without, alone or in a group, at home, the car, church, wherever, and with fully formed thoughts, or not.

We can pray for ourselves, our friends, neighbors, or total strangers. We can give thanks or ask for help. We can simply lift up those people and events that are in our hearts.

Basically, what I discovered, is that prayer can be just about anything, as long as I enter into that moment with the intention of opening my heart to God.

What is your experience of prayer? Is prayer difficult, or does it flow naturally through you? Do you prefer to pray alone, with a stream of consciousness, or do you find it more fulfilling to pray in church using the prayers found in the Book of Common Prayer?

I mean this question honestly, and we'd love comments, answers, shared stories, and experiences. What is prayer for you? Is it easy or a struggle? Are there moments in your life when prayer was easier?

This week, I have homework for you. Have dinner with your family, your friends, yourself. And before you eat, take a moment to give thanks for what is before you. Give thanks for all of the hands that have played a role in that food making it to your table, from the people who planted the seeds all the way to whoever cooked the meal. And then take a deep breath, and don't think for a moment. Just be silent, let God in to the silence. Then say a prayer of any kind, and eat.

Take a moment. Be intentional. Open yourself to God's presence, and what God is trying to tell you.

Questions:

- What is prayer?
- Why do we pray?
- Is it important to pray?
- What are a bunch of different things (or people) to pray for, and why are you praying for them?
- Is it OK to pray for other people?
- How do you like to pray?
- Do you think you could say one short prayer every day for a week?
- If you were to pray right now, who/what would you pray for and why?

GIVING FROM ABUNDANCE

Lord, we pray for the power to be gentle; the strength to be forgiving; the patience to be understanding; and the endurance to accept the consequences of holding to what we believe to be right.

This is a portion of a prayer for World Peace published in 1978. But when I read this recently, I thought of St. Andrew's and everything that fills my heart with pride when I think of what we have created together. This spirit evoked in that prayer is pervasive in our gatherings. I honestly believe that when we gather, there is an example of what Christian community can look like while acknowledging our brokenness and need for daily grace from our Creator. Finally, beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you. (Philippians 4:8-9)

Consider giving from the abundance of God's blessing to you and I am certain that we will have plenty for the ministry that we share. See you in church!

DIOCESAN CONVENTION REFLECTIONS

On Nov. 2, Clyde, Kate, Chris Stockwell, and I headed into Boston for the 234th Annual Diocesan Convention. It was a crisp sunny day for travel into the city. I reminisced about last year's travel to the Cape with Ed Bell in torrential rain. God was our co-pilot that day!

We arrived at the Back Bay Convention Center at 8:30 a.m. to join hundreds of attendees from dozens of the parishes that make up the diocese. The convention was attended by clergy, delegates, and lay people. It was so nice to see familiar faces, and to meet others.

The head table was graced by Bishop Alan Gates, Bishop Gayle Harris, and other people from the diocese. We watched a video by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry titled "The Way Of Love." I was very moved by his powerful delivery. Bishop Alan Gates delivered his annual address to us. You can watch his video at the Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts website (news@diomass.org).

The day was filled with speeches from different groups. I was impressed, in particular, with the Youth Groups for what they stand for, their beliefs, and the roles each seems to play in their groups. They spoke from their hearts of their experiences and how they encourage others to unite in their cause.

Chris was struck by the civility and compassion present throughout the proceedings. In particular, one of four resolutions brought forth at convention concerned supporting legislative change for prisoners sentenced to life without parole to be given the opportunity for a hearing during the 25th year of their incarceration. Approximately 30 attendees spoke both in favor and against the resolution, which did pass; but with many in the audience voting against. Throughout, the audience was attentive, respectful, and thoughtful. There was no jeering, no hissing, no booing—only well-developed, relevant considerations. The respect shown by everyone to everyone was remarkable, and exemplifies that our society can have civil discourse, still, whenever participants are so inclined.

We all attended a beautiful Eucharistic service at Emmanuel Episcopal Church of Boston. I was taken by the church's structure, size, and beautiful stained glass windows. Bishop Gates and Bishop Harris officiated the service, with strong presence of young lay leaders. The day ended with both of us thinking what an honor and privilege it is to be around such spiritual beauty.

I know faith formation in this world is hard, for a lot of reasons. I developed 8 Minutes a Week because my hope is that it fits into busy lives to give children a faith foundation that they can develop later on, which practices like the Way of Love can help with as adults.

You all are an incredible group, and I'm genuinely impressed with your desire and willingness to grow deeper in your faith. I feel honored and excited to journey with you all.

"GREENSLEEVES" CHRISTMAS MUSICAL PLAY DEC. 14



Parishioner Bobbie Wayne will present a one-woman Christmas musical play, "Greensleeves," Saturday, December 14, at 7:30 p.m. as a benefit for our *Growing into Our Future* capital campaign.

Wayne, a multimedia artist, will trace the history of the American Christmas celebration in poetry, lore, and music sung and played on Celtic harp. The candle-lit performance will include songs in eight different languages and will be informative, entertaining, funny, and poignant. The goal is to leave the audience "in quiet contemplation of the promise of Christmas and the hope of peace for all," Wayne says.

Wayne, who has a BA in music and an MFA in fine arts, is an artist, writer, and musician who has also worked as a music therapist. She plays popular music of the eighteenth century—on both Celtic harp and

mountain dulcimer—at historic sites along with her husband, Dan Mozell. She first wrote the "Greensleeves" Christmas show in 1989 and has performed it since in churches, theaters, and concert halls in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, and Tennessee. It is recommended for ages seven and up.

Tickets are \$25 for adults and \$10 for ages 17 and under, and may be reserved by calling the parish office at 781-631-4951. Babysitting will be provided at no charge. Proceeds benefit our *Growing into Our Future* capital campaign, for projects in support of our upcoming 100th anniversary.

UPDATE: WELCOME THE STRANGER

Welcome the Stranger, an interfaith collaboration with Temple Emanu-el and Old North Church, is a key part of our outreach activities at St. Andrew's. Simply put, Welcome the Stranger seeks to provide help to people in need who are outside the boundaries of our respective congregations. They may be refugees from a faraway land or people nearby in neighboring communities.

By collaborating with other congregations, we felt we could take on things together that would be challenging to accomplish individually. We've also become good friends and have delighted in sharing in each other's worship traditions. A few weeks ago, many parishioners from St. Andrew's attended a Friday evening Shabbat service at Temple Eamanu-el. We'll host a service after the holidays. We also plan to organize another Progressive Dinner. The first two were lots of fun!

Regarding our outreach activities, after fleeing to safety from their homeland, the asylum-seeking family that we supported through RIM (Refugee Immigration Ministry) is still following a lengthy legal process in hopes of being granted permanent asylum. While our group continues to provide love and support, the family has worked very hard and has been financially independent for the past year. Danie obtained her Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) certification and has been working in a local nursing home, filling a real need, especially considering the critical labor shortage for these types of positions. Earlier this month, working with Catholic Charities, with only two weeks' notice, our group set up an apartment in Salem for a family of five from Moldova (next to the Ukraine). They have been waiting for years to go through the legal immigration process and their approval finally came. Thanks to our recent Rummage Sale, we were able to go "shopping' and obtain many needed items without cost. Beyond these donations, we are not providing any financial support to these individuals because, as legal immigrants, they are entitled to work in this country.

Finally, we would like to engage the youth from our respective congregations in outreach activities. Plans are currently underway for a "Build a Bed" project that helps ensure children living in poverty have beds to sleep in.
