
#### This Changes Everything

The final installment of the Climate Change series will occur on Wednesday, February 13, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. *This Changes Everything*, an award-winning documentary inspired by the international bestseller of the same name by Naomi Klein, will be viewed and discussed. It has been heralded as the twenty-first century version of *Silent Spring*.

Twenty percent of the world's population produces seventy percent of the carbon, and those most affected by climate change and its ensuing economic injustice are the least responsible for creating it. *This Changes Everything* features portraits of individuals from seven communities around the globe, from Montana, to Alberta, to southern India, to Beijing, and beyond, and interweaves their stories and struggles with the failed economic systems that created the problem.

#### Clerk

**Pamela Gore:** I am honored to be nominated to serve as Vestry clerk. Four years ago, the church I was attending in Salem closed. Having moved to the North Shore just a year before that, I was still unfamiliar with the area's church landscape. First on my list to visit was St. Andrew's, because of the labyrinth. Several years ago, I served as secretary on the board of the local chapter of a professional association and took on other administrative positions.

My service here at St. Andrew's began when I signed up to be a reader, a ministry I love. This past fall, I assisted Clyde with the Adult Forum's Saints Series. Recently I began working with Clyde and Jutta Ayer in putting together the meditation services that are held on the last Friday of each month.

I love to learn and teach, and when not teaching I tend to be more of a listener than a talker. In fact, I consider listening to others as a ministry. While curious about everything, my other ministry interests turn toward spiritual formation and experience, liturgy, and administration and organization.

Out of the many churches I have attended, St. Andrew's is by far the most friendly, welcoming, and accepting. The wide array of programs and ways to serve is amazing. St. Andrew's is truly a vibrant church with many gifted and dedicated people. If elected, I would be very excited to contribute my experience, gifts, and skills to the growth of this wonderful community.

**James Dykes:** I first became acquainted with St Andrew's in the summer of 1967. 
#### **BOOK GROUP**
